Spotlight on Public Safety

With community support Hercules continues to prioritize fiscal stability and accountability, while maintaining Hercules as a safe, well-maintained community. Residents place a high priority on public safety services. I am proud to let you know that just recently, Hercules was identified as the 19th safest city in California based on calendar year 2014 data by Safewise - [California's 50 Safest Cities](#).

One of the City's top priorities is to maintain current levels of local public safety services, without having to contract out. With locally-controlled funding, Hercules has been able to maintain the local Hercules Police Department and services, including 9-1-1 response times, the number of police officers patrolling neighborhood streets and neighborhood crime prevention programs. As the 19th safest city in California, we must keep it this way.

The City of Hercules will continue to keep the community informed about the City's ongoing efforts to maintain financial stability, accountability and essential City services that make our community a safe, well-maintained place to live. Telecommunication Tower and Wireless Facility Discussion Update

The Planning Commission meet on Monday, July 20, 2015 to discuss a draft Telecommunications Ordinance, which has not been updated since 1997. After making suggested modifications to the draft Ordinance, the Planning Commission passed a Resolution to recommend that the City Council adopt a new Telecommunications Ordinance as discussed in their meeting. The City Council will hold a public hearing and consider adopting the new Wireless Telecommunications Facility Ordinance at their August 11, 2015 meeting. Maintenance & Operations – Staff completed their regularly scheduled janitorial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. They coordinated with the West Contra Costa County Integrated Waste Management Authority on solid waste issues, Ducks Unlimited on the Chelsea Wetlands Restoration Project, and continue to evaluate water reduction strategies. Staff repaired streetlights and signs throughout town and is working with contractors on weed abatement for the Summer season, including Goats R Us. Public Works staff also installed additional rafters on the

pergola in Frog Pad Park to increase shade, patched potholes on Willow Avenue, and repaired the timer for one of the fountains in Refugio Park Lake.

Engineering – Trail paving on the \$7M Bay Trail phase of the Regional Intermodal Transit Center R(ITC) in Hercules is tentatively scheduled to begin later this week and the project is 85% complete. Bids that were received for the next phase, the \$12M Path To Transit, were higher than anticipated and the project was subsequently rebid earlier this week with the hope that contractors will sharpen their pencils and come down on their price. Staff continues to make progress in securing the permits from the environmental regulatory agencies and \$3.8M in Measure J funding was appropriated to the project by the Contra Costa Transportation Authority. The Willow Avenue Rehabilitation Project is tentatively scheduled to go out to bid on August 3 and the encroachment permit from Caltrans was received this week. Staff completed the field review with Caltrans for the Refugio Valley Road Rehabilitation Project scheduled for next summer. Rough grading for the Muir Pointe residential development is underway and anticipated to last 1 more week. The final map and grading plans are under review. The 100% Plans for the \$48M Pinole-Hercules Waste Water Treatment are undergoing final review and the prequalification process for potential contractors is underway.

Hercules Police Department

Right-of-Way at Crosswalks

In continuing efforts to improve pedestrian safety in Hercules, the Hercules Police Department has conducted directed enforcement at specific problematic intersections. Drivers are encouraged to yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, as required by law.

Below are the applicable sections of the California Vehicle Code listing the requirements of the law:

21950 CVC (a) *The driver of a **vehicle** shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.*

(b) *This section does not relieve a pedestrian from the duty of using due care for his or her safety. No pedestrian may suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a **vehicle** that is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard. No pedestrian may unnecessarily stop or delay traffic while in a marked or unmarked crosswalk.*

(c) *The driver of a **vehicle** approaching a pedestrian within any marked or unmarked crosswalk shall exercise all due care and shall reduce the speed of the **vehicle** or take any other action relating to the operation of the **vehicle** as necessary to safeguard the safety of the pedestrian.*

(d) *Subdivision (b) does not relieve a driver of a **vehicle** from the duty of exercising due care for the safety of any pedestrian within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.*

The reporting party said an African American female was looking over customers shoulders while they were using the ATM machines.
