**CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE**

**FY 2018/19 Budget Approved**

On Tuesday this week, at the conclusion of their second public hearing on the proposed FY 2018/19 budget, the City Council approved the spending plan for the year starting July 1, 2018. The City's General Fund budget, which is where our main services like Police, Parks & Recreation, and other core services are funded is just over \$15 million. A highlight of this year's budget was the addition of one (1) additional police officer position in an effort to move us closer to the goal of maintaining one (1) officer per thousand of population. In addition, the City Council utilized some one-time monies to increase the General Fund Reserve for Fiscal Neutrality to be three (3) months of expenditures instead of two (2) months, and that reserve will now have just over \$3.68 million to assist the City weathering any downturns in the economy or to meet any unexpected needs. Additional one-time monies were also set aside with \$1 million being added to the \$500,000 IRS Section 115 Pension Trust established last year to help mitigate increasing employee retirement costs. The FY 2018/19 budget was approved with a small operating deficit of just over \$100,000, which will be covered by reserves if necessary. The City is still in negotiations with its employee groups which may result in some higher costs than budgeted as well. The 2018/19 fiscal year is the first of a transition year where we are having bridge from now and our current resource levels to two (2) to three (3) years out where revenues from new developments like Safeway and the City's first hotel will expand our on-going revenue base.

**Police Chief Bill Goswick Retires**

Police Chief Bill Goswick was recognized at the City Council meeting for his more than 40 years of service to the Hercules community. Chief Goswick is retiring formally at the end of the month and has been a great contributor the Hercules Police Department, the City of Hercules, and countless community organizations. The City is in the process of hiring a new Police Chief, and in the interim Commander Thomas Koeppel will be serving as the Acting Police Chief. Congratulations and best wishes to Chief Bill Goswick for a rich and relaxing retirement.

### Hercules General Municipal Election – Filing Period Opens Soon

The City of Hercules holds its General Municipal Elections in November of each even numbered year, therefore a General Municipal Election will be held in the City of Hercules on November 6, 2018 to elect two (2) members of the City Council which have expiring terms at the end of this year. Members of the City Council are elected to four (4) year terms. The November 6, 2018 General Municipal Election Nomination Period begins on July 16, 2018 and closes on August 10, 2018 (the 88<sup>th</sup> day before the election). If an incumbent officer does not run for office by the 88<sup>th</sup> day (August 10, 2018) for that incumbent's elective office, the close of the nomination period will extend to August 15, 2018 at 5:00 p.m.

**Note:** A candidate for state or local office must file Form 501 "Candidate Intention Statement" before soliciting or receiving any contributions or making any expenditures from personal funds on behalf of your candidacy. Form 501 is filed with the Hercules City Clerk located at 111 Civic Drive, Hercules, CA 94547.

It is recommended that you make an appointment with the City Clerk to pull Nomination Papers during normal business hours once the nomination period opens.

### **Continued Public Hearing on Blocks Q & R within the Waterfront on 5/7/2018**

The Planning Commission will hold an additional Design Review public hearing for the next 2 City blocks within the Bayfront Waterfront Master Plan Area (known as blocks Q&R) adjacent to the Muir Pointe subdivision currently under construction by Taylor Morrison. The project site is bounded on the West by John Muir Parkway and on the South by the North Channel (near Tioga Loop) south of Bayfront Boulevard (also referred to as Blocks “Q&R” or Parcels 29 & 30 in the Vesting Tentative Map) within the larger Bayfront Master Plan Area.

The proposed project consists of a single building with two landscaped courtyards that is a 4-story residential apartment building with 232 apartment units (with approximately 15 units being affordable), along with approximately 12,000 gross square feet of lobby and residential amenity spaces. There is one mostly below grade parking level with 221 spaces and one above grade parking level with 91 spaces (totaling 314 spaces) that are wrapped with units and a residential lobby with 1 ingress/egress access point for each parking level (without the 2 garage tied together). This project is the second project to move forward in the area covered under the Waterfront District Master Plan (adopted by the City in 2008 out of the original Initiative process with several revisions made over the years).



**Robbery/Strong-arm:** On June 14, 2018 at 8:53am a robbery occurred in the 1500 block of Sycamore Ave (Rite Aid). **Attempt Residential Burglary:** On June 14, 2018 an attempt burglary occurred in the 1000 block of Canterbury. At 1:27pm the resident called and said 15 minutes prior to calling there were two Asian, or Hispanic male adults, wearing dark shirt and masks, trying to kick in her front door. After the victim announced her presence the suspects fled in an unknown direction.

**CRIME PRENTION TIP: It is a very good idea to make you presence known, if someone is trying to get in your house. Do so WHILE YOU ARE CALLING 911 and tell the crooks you are are doing so. Never hesitate to call 911 if you see something suspicious, or feel threatened.**

**Pursuit:** On June 14, 2018 at 1:32pm an officer initiated a vehicle pursuit in the area of Church Lane and El Portal Drive in San Pablo. The suspect vehicle (Blue Mercedes) was observed leaving the parking lot of the San Pablo Towne Shopping Center at a high rate of speed. The driver then violated several traffic violations. HPD officers tried to conduct a traffic stop but the driver continued to try evade. A pursuit was initiated but terminated when the driver of the Mercedes drove into the opposite lanes of traffic. On June 14, 2018, at approximately 11:00 am, the below pictured African American male, entered Home Depot and loaded up a shopping cart with power tools. He went directly to the contractors exit, and walked right by two working registers, with employees at them, without attempting to pay. The male loaded the power tools into older model blue Nissan Maxima with tape over the license plates. There appeared to be at least one more occupant in the vehicle. (See photo below)



**Vandalism/Mail Theft/Found Property:** On June 15, 2018 at 6:55am a resident from the 300 block of Brighton found loose mail, and property that was stolen yesterday from an auto burglary, in the street. An officer took possession of the mail. During an area check the officer located three clusters of mailboxes, in the Foxboro Downs complex, that had been pried open.

**Stolen Plate:** On June 15, 2018 at 9:42am, HPD officers were dispatched to the 1500 block of Sycamore regarding a suspicious vehicle. The caller said the African American male driver, of a newer model black Audi, was looking into vehicles in the parking lot of 3700 block of San Pablo Ave. When the subject realized the witness was watching him he left the area. The license plate on the Audi came back to a Chevy with a Hercules address. The owner of the Chevy was contacted made aware his license plate had been stolen. A report was taken.

**Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol:** On June 16, 2018, at approximately 12:49 am, an Officer stopped a green, 1998, Chrysler Sebring, at 3600 San Pablo Avenue, for expired registration. The 35 year old female driver, from Rodeo, displayed objective signs of being under the influence of alcohol. **Shoplifting/Evading in a reckless manner:** On June 20, 2018, at approximately 7:04 pm, HPD Officers were dispatched to Home Depot for the report of a suspicious subject, who has been known to steal merchandise in the past. As Officers were arriving on scene Dispatch updated the subject was with another person and they had grabbed a drill set, and were headed toward the exit. The subjects were associated with a black SUV. As Officers were arriving a newer model, possibly 2017, black GMC, with the partial plate was leaving the lot with a African American male adult driver, and at least two African American adult passengers. Officers attempted to stop the vehicle in the parking lot; however, the GMC drove around Officers and exited onto Sycamore east bound. There was a paper license plate on the front of the vehicle. The two male suspects were dropped off by the GMC, and went into Home Depot and were inside for a couple of minutes before grabbing two Drill sets. Each Suspect walked out through the main entrance right past the Customer Service desk, carrying one drill set each without attempting to pay for them. The GMC pulled up right outside the exit, and the suspects got into the vehicle. The suspects were later identified.

**Warrant Arrest:** On June 21, 2018, at approximately 12:22 am, an Officer was checking on a suspicious vehicle near 100 block of Paradise Drive, and contacted a 32 year old female of Richmond. She had a warrant from San Jose State University PD. She was issued a new court date.

Reporting Party said she was dating the Subject for approximately 1 week. RP said she received several text messages and social media messages through different social media accounts from him with vague threats. The Subject was very upset over RP ending their relationship. A case was documented due to the incident because RP was very upset and frightened over the situation.

**Stolen Vehicle:** On June 21, 2018, at approximately 10:00 pm, an Officer was dispatched to 100 block of Paradise Drive for the report of a stolen vehicle. The Officer arrived, and spoke to Reporting party, who is the girlfriend of the Subject. RP told the Officer the Subject was at her home earlier today, and her car keys went missing sometime between 9:00 am, and 9:30 pm. **Domestic Battery with Corporal Injury:** On June 22, 2018, at approximately 11:18 pm, HPD Officers were dispatched to 200 block of Pepperwood for a disturbance. Officers arrived and

contacted the Crime Victim and a female. CV and the female have been in a dating relationship for approximately 2 years. CV had abrasions to his face, and hand. It was determined both had been drinking alcohol, and the female was upset over another girlfriend. The female hit the CV several times on the face causing abrasions to his face and hand where he was trying to block her attack. The female was placed under arrest for Domestic Battery with corporal injury, and a rifle was taken for safekeeping from the home. The female was transported to Martinez Detention Facility.

**Auto Burglary:** On June 23, 2018 at 9:50am an auto burglary occurred in the 3700 block of San Pablo Ave. The vehicle was UV zipcar rental out of SF with a Florida license plates. Two males reported that they went in to get coffee from Starbucks before going golfing. Both were only in Starbucks for approx. five minutes when a man ran in asking who owned a Grey Ford Flex and that it had one of the windows smashed. Both exited Starbucks and saw their vehicle had been burglarized. The take was personal property belonging to one of the victim that consisted of a Black/Grey Jansport backpack that contained personal belongings located in the rear trunk space of the vehicle. There was no suspect information or witnesses at this time.

**Possession Stolen Property/Obstruction:** On June 23, 2018 at 9:37am, Hercules PD officers were dispatched to a report of a suspicious vehicle in the area of Cardinal Way at Pheasant Drive. Pinole PD dispatch advised that the vehicle was a blue Honda CRV. The reporting party said they saw someone walking to the car with no shirt on. The RP thought the subject might be living in the car. The first officer arrived on scene and ran the plate on the vehicle which came as stolen out of Pleasant Hills about a month ago. The African American male subject was held at gunpoint until other officers arrived, at which time he was taken into custody without incident. The Subject refused to give the officer any identifying information at the scene. Mobile ID was ineffective. Post Miranda, The Subject told the officer his friend let him borrow the car to use. However, he couldn't remember his friend's name or any other information about his friend. He said he intended to park the vehicle in Hercules and leave it. At that time, the subject refused to answer any more questions. There was a key in the vehicle's ignition that appeared to for the Honda. The registered owner of the vehicle was contacted and agreed to respond to pick up his vehicle. Registered owner arrived on scene at about 10:58am. He told the officer his vehicle was stolen from his residence about a month ago after he left the key inside the vehicle. No one had permission to be in possession of his vehicle. The vehicle was released to the registered owner. The Subject was transported to the HPD for booking. The officer performed a live scan of the Subject and forwarded it to the Contra Costa County Sheriff's Office. CCCSO called back and said they were unable to get a finger print hit through Contra Costa County records and Alameda County records, DOJ, FBI, and ICE. MDF initially refused to book the subject as a John Doe. We needed to identify him first. They later said they would accept him as long as charges were filed on Monday. At about 1:40pm the subject eventually told Sgt. Taylor his real name. The name was confirmed and Subject was transported to Martinez Detention Facility for theft and obstruction charges.

**Auto Burglary:** ? On June 23, 2018 at 9:15am a vandalism occurred at the 76 gas station in the 800 block of Willow Ave. A dog was fastened to a rack outside the gas station, and began running around the gas pumps with the attached rack. The dog ran past victim's vehicle, a Grey 2008 BMW 335i, that was parked IFO of 76 gas station and caused minor damage to the BMW. The owner of the dog, of Rodeo, secured her dog and removed it from the attached rack. The victim

checked her vehicle and saw damage to the rear passenger side door and confronted the dog owner. The dog owner was apologetic but stated that it was not her fault. Dog owner gave Barbosa her contact info and left the scene before officers arrived. An attempted was made to contact the dog owner by phone and the call went to voicemail. A message was left for the dog owner to contact the investigating officer.

**Hit and Run:** On June 23, 2018 at 3:16pm, an officer was dispatched to Malibu near light house for a hit and run collision. The RP/V returned home today and notice a note on her vehicle from one of her neighbors saying they saw the car that hit her vehicle with a plate number. The witness said the collision occurred on Monday. The registration for the responsible vehicle came back to a cab company out of Oakland.

**Wildland fire with evacuations:** On June 24, 2018 at 12:26 PM, Officers were advised of a grass fire on the hillside, behind Finch Ct. Upon arrival, Officers discovered the fire had spread the width of three residential lots and was moving up the hill at a moderate pace. Fire crews from RHFD, Pinole, Carquinez and Con-fire arrived to assist. The wind picked up and caused the fire to spread eastward, at a rapid pace. Based on wind conditions and residences being in the path of the fire, mandatory evacuations were ordered by fire personnel. Officers conducted door to door evacuations for approximately 15 residences.

Air support from Cal-fire arrived and quickly contained the fire. Sheriff's deputies also arrived on scene and assisted with traffic control. There was no loss of property or injuries reported as a result of the fire.

**Evading** On June 25<sup>th</sup> 2018 at approximately 10:57PM a HPD Officer attempted to conduct a traffic enforcement stop on a red 1999 Isuzu Rodeo in the area of San Pablo Ave and John Muir Parkway. The vehicle failed to yield and continued eastbound onto I-80. The pursuit continued until the suspect took the Cummings Skyway exit and got back onto westbound I-80. The vehicle yielded at the bottom of the on ramp. The driver of San Francisco and passenger of San Francisco were taken into custody. Neither subject spoke English so the Language Line was utilized to obtain a statement. The driver stated he thought an ambulance and not a police vehicle was behind for the duration of the pursuit. He later admitted to figuring out that it was in fact the law but could not provide a reason for why he did not yield. Passenger stated she and the driver are janitors and were on their way home. The pursuit lasted approximately 2.5 miles and reached a top speed of 60MPH. The driver was clear of any wants and possessed a valid CDL. Additionally, he was the registered owner of the vehicle. The driver was cite/released on his promise to appear. The passenger was released and the vehicle was towed.

**Vandalism** On June 25<sup>th</sup> 2018 at approximately 11:15PM a HPD Officer was dispatched to the 3900 block of San Pablo Ave for vandalism to a vehicle. The reporting party stated his girlfriend keyed and broke the rear view mirror of his 2016 Chrysler. The reporting party declined to press charges. Report taken for documentation purposes.

**Residential Burglary** On June 25<sup>th</sup> 2018 at approximately 11:50PM a HPD Officer was dispatched to a residence in the 100 block of Peridot Ct for a residential burglary. The incident occurred on this date between 11:00AM and time of call. Unknown suspect(s) forced open his front door and ransacked his house.

**Residential burglary:** On June 26, 2018 at 12:53 PM, officers were dispatched to the 200 block

of Obsidian for an interrupted residential burglary. The suspects rang the victim's doorbell several times but she did not answer or acknowledge their presence. The suspects forced the front door open and the resident screamed at them. The suspects, described as two young African American males, fled to a waiting vehicle. One suspect was described as being rather taller with short hair and wearing a multi-colored striped shirt. The vehicle was described as a black Chevy Impala. Security camera footage, from a neighbor's residence, showed the suspects casing the victim's house for approximately 25 minutes before trying make entry.

If someone answers the door the suspect makes an excuse as to why they are there (looking for someone, selling magazines, etc.) and leaves. If there is no response the suspect(s) force entry into the home. In several cases suspects, and vehicles, were seen, or captured on video. The suspects are described as young (17-25) African American males. The vehicles are described as black sedans, with no plates, paper plates, or covered plates. No suspects have been identified at this time.**

**WHAT DO YOU DO IF YOU ARE HOME AND SOMEONE RINGS YOUR DOOR BELL, OR KNOCKS ON YOUR DOOR? If you do not know the person(s), do not open the door, but let them know someone is home. If the person seems suspicious CALL THE**

**POLICE. If you see someone “lurking” in your neighborhood CALL THE POLICE.**
