**New Republic Services Programs for Hercules Residents**

Republic Services, the City's solid waste services provider, is launching two new **FREE** programs starting in February.

**New Compost Giveaway Program**



Republic Services is providing a new opportunity for the West Contra Costa community to receive free compost. Close the loop on your organics recycling by using the finished compost made locally in Richmond. Starting February 6<sup>th</sup> and each 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday of the month thereafter, West County households can come to 101 Pittsburg Avenue, Richmond, from 9am - 4pm and get up to 2 cubic yards of compost per month.

This compost is great for gardens and landscaping. This is self-service only so please BYOB (Bring Your Own bag, bin or bucket) and shovel to load the material. Valid identification is required.

**Say Bye Bye to Your Old Mattress**



Republic Services has teamed up with Bye Bye Mattress, *A Program of the Mattress Recycling Council*, to provide a collection site for old unwanted mattresses or box springs. Starting February 1, 2019, households in the cities of Richmond, Hercules, Pinole, San Pablo, El Cerrito and unincorporated communities (including Alhambra Valley-west side, Bayview, East Richmond Heights, North Richmond, Rollingwood and Tara Hills of Montalvin, El Sobrante) are eligible to bring 3 items per month to be recycled. Businesses are not allowed to use this collection site but can bring items to the Golden Bear Transfer Station (1 Parr Blvd. Richmond - fees

apply). Republic Services can only accept whole items. No excessively wet, damaged, partial or soiled mattresses or mattresses with bed bugs. Car beds, fold out sofa beds and futons, waterbeds, air mattresses, sleeping bags, pillows, mattress toppers or other furniture are not accepted.

Mattresses can be dropped off Wednesday – Saturday 9am-4pm at 101 Pittsburg Avenue, Richmond. Please bring proper identification or utility bill with address of household generating the items.

### **City Council Workshop on Tuesday, February 12, 2019 at 7pm regarding the Draft Transportation Impact Nexus Report**

Last April the City Council had a kick-off workshop on updating the City’s Traffic Impact Fees once they adopted a new improvement list with the Circulation Element. A draft report is being presented to Council at this workshop to review the needed transportation improvement projects that need to be constructed to mitigate traffic impacts as new development is fully built out in the City. There are 21 transportation projects listed in the report, varying from street and intersection improvements for cars, improvements to bicycle and pedestrian lanes and sidewalk and improvements to transit. Below is an abbreviated list of enhancements that new development are anticipated to pay their “fair share” towards as they pull their building permits. It will then be up to the City to construct needed improvements when needed as prioritized by the City Council with other funding from other grant and tax sources providing the financial gaps that are the City’s responsibility.

**PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT**

**Maintenance & Operations**

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. The Street Sign Replacement Project is approximately 1/3 completed, with the remaining signs on order. The long-awaited permit from Bay Area Air Quality Management District was received for the replacement generator at the Community Center. Putting the new generator on-line is now proceeding with a commissioning date of February 18. A damaged section of fencing in the Dog Park was repaired. A contract to paint red curb throughout town was put out to bid. The design for the Corporation Yard sewer lateral installation was completed and will be put out to bid shortly. Contracts to repair 23 sidewalk locations were executed and the work is now underway.

**Engineering**

The \$52M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is nearing completion, with an anticipated substantial completion date of June 2019. While overall the project is proceeding smoothly, power and gas services provided by PG&E were delayed. The cost impact of this delay is being assessed. The design plans are under review for the public improvements for the future Safeway, located at the southeast corner of San Pablo and Sycamore Avenue, as well as the Bayfront Project for Blocks Q&R, and the Willow Center. Work on the Refugio Valley Pedestrian Trail Resurfacing Project is nearing completion. Work on the new bathroom and sport

court at Duck Pond Park is also nearing completion. Consultant contracts for Willdan to perform a financial study on the sewer fund and West Yost to provide wastewater engineering services were executed, as was Carollo's contract to replace the sewer trunk main leading into the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant.

The Internal Revenue Service DOES NOT CALL PEOPLE ABOUT THEIR SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNTS, OR DELINQUENT TAXES!!!!!! THIS IS A SCAM. The IRS certainly does not ask for payment with prepaid gift or cash cards. Do not**

**give these callers any personal information, confirm information, or answer any questions with the answer "yes". Hang up immediately.**
