Thanksgiving Holiday Closure

We hope that our Hercules residents have a wonderful Thanksgiving holiday. In recognition of Thanksgiving, City offices will be closed starting Wednesday, November 27th with offices reopening on Monday, December 2nd.

Streetlight Replacement

Property owners in two Landscape & Lighting Assessment District Zones approved increased assessments earlier this year to fund the replacement of failing hollow-core wooden streetlights with new metal poles and more energy efficient LED lights. The first 25 lights were replaced earlier this year, and now the contractor is working to replace the remaining 160 lights in the Zone 1 – Hercules by the Bay, and Zone 7 – Refugio Heights. Thank you to those who supported the assessment increase which will enhance their neighborhoods, reduce energy consumption and costs, and reduce liability exposure. We are happy that the replacements will be completed soon.

Planning Commission – One (1) Vacancy with a term ending December 2021

The Planning Commission meets the first and third Mondays of every month at 7 p.m. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has statutory duties imposed by State law. The Commission:

- Performs all functions assigned to it by the zoning and design review ordinances of the City.

- Reviews and makes recommendations to the Council on the general plan, specific neighborhood plans, tentative subdivision maps, environmental impact reports, and planned unit developments.
- Reviews the capital improvements program and makes recommendations to the Council.
- Provides design review of proposed buildings and other construction projects and reviews landscape plans.
- Grants use permits and variances.

Community & Library Services Commission – One (1) Student Commissioner with a term ending December 2021.

The Community and Library Services Commission meets on the second Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Hercules City Council Chambers located at 111 Civic Drive, Hercules, CA 94547. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has the following duties:

- Develop plans and recommendations for parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and use of community buildings.
- Work with the Parks and Recreation Department on the development and evaluation of recreation programs and community activities/events.
- Provide assistance and support in the planning and operation of City sponsored community events.
- In cooperation and consultation with the Parks and Recreation Department, make recommendations to the City Council with respect to priorities for recreation, library, and community services expenditures in the City's capital improvement program.
- Review and comment on the annual operating and capital improvement budgets for the Parks and Recreation Department.
- Make recommendations with respect to community service needs such as child care, youth summer employment, senior activities/programs, and recreational programs.
- Review and make recommendations with respect to fees for the use of parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and community buildings.
- Advise on matters of policy and public interest related to the management, use and preservation of library facilities and property.
- Render such other specific services as are consistent with the role of an advisory board on the library system, to include recommendations and advice to the county librarian on matters related to the Hercules library.
- The Commission member serving as the City's Area Representative to the Contra Costa County Library Commission shall routinely report to the entire Community and Library Services Commission on actions taken at the Contra Costa Library Commission meetings.
- Review and make recommendations regarding the Arts in Public Places Program and exhibits at the Hercules Public Library.
- Oversee the Heritage Memorial Garden Plaque Program which is designed to recognize Hercules residents or civic leaders and enhance the historical aspect of the garden.
- Oversee the Library Art Exhibition Program which is designed to review art pieces submitted by participants of the program to be allowed to display their art pieces at the Hercules Public Library.
- Such other duties relating to recreation activities and community and library service needs as may be directed by the City Council.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. At this time the Street Sign Replacement Project is approximately 90% completed and the remaining signs have been received and are being stored at the Maintenance Yard. Public Works is working with BioRad to replace median island trees in the Business Park. The trees have been removed, the replacement trees have been selected, and the installation is being bid out. Staff is moving forward with replacing 160 streetlights in Lighting and Landscaping District 83-2, Zones 1 “Hercules by the Bay” and 2 “The Heights”. Street tree trimming in Promenade was completed, street trees were removed and replaced in Baywood, and tree trimming is being scheduled for San Pablo between Hercules Avenue and Tsushima Avenue, as well as Victoria by the Bay. Staff responded to multiple fallen trees and limbs. Quarterly maintenance of the sewer lift stations is underway and repairs to sidewalk at approximately 33 locations throughout town

were completed. A contract has been executed to install the awning at the Corp Yard and that work is being scheduled. Red curbing is being replaced in Victoria by the Bay.

Engineering

The \$52M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project achieved substantial completion as of October 1st, with an anticipated final completion date in December. While overall the project is proceeding smoothly, power and gas services provided by PG&E were delayed. The cost impact of this delay is being assessed. The design plans are under final review for the public improvements for the future Safeway, located at the southeast corner of San Pablo and Sycamore Avenue. The utility plan was issued and underground work has been completed. The installation of the public improvements for the Bayfront Project are underway for Blocks Q&R and the plans are under review for Blocks M,O, & P. The design plans are also under review for the Willow Center, Sycamore Crossing, and the Hilltown projects. Design is underway for the mile long segment of sewer trunk main leading into the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant, computer flow modeling continues for the City's backbone sewer system, as is the financial study for the sewer fund. The 2019 Street Rehabilitation Project on Pheasant Drive and the Hercules Avenue Traffic Calming Project were accepted by Council on November 12. The Willow/Palm sidewalk project and Lake Refugio Dredging project are under design and staff continues to assist the Engie Company with the evaluation of potential energy saving facilities such as solar arrays and light retrofits on City buildings and land. The pedestrian enhancement projects at Sycamore/Civic and San Pablo/Sycamore is undergoing 90% review.



Vandalism (Multiple Vehicle's): On October 30, 2019, at 10:17 a.m., an Officer responded to the area of Village Parkway at Hercules Avenue for a report of a vehicle vandalism that occurred last night after 8:30 p.m. A BB pellet was located at the scene and is believed to have caused the damage. Eleven vehicles with shattered driver's side windows were located at the following locations: **Sycamore at Earnest, Railroad Avenue, Santa Fe Avenue, and Village Parkway.** BB's were located in or about several of these vehicles. There is no suspect information at this time.

Stolen Vehicle: On October 30, 2019, at 2:54 p.m., a citizen reported his blue 2011 Toyota RAV4, was stolen from the 100 block of Bonny Doone. The vehicle was last seen in front of his house on the evening of October 28, 2019.

Lost Property: On October 30, 2019, at 4:27 p.m., a citizen reported losing his Trinidad and Tobago Passport sometime in August, 2019. He was unsure where he left it.

Vehicle vs. Pedestrian: On October 31, 2019, at 1:48 p.m., a citizen reported a vehicle versus pedestrian (bicyclist) collision in the 2100 block of Railroad Avenue. Officers arrived and found the bicyclist, a 67 year old male subject of Hercules lying on the roadway. He sustained abrasions to his arms and lacerations to his head. It was determined that the driver of a 2018 Honda Civic, a 61 year old male subject from Hercules was negotiating a left turn onto Sycamore Avenue from southbound Railroad Avenue when the cyclist failed to stop at a stop sign. The cyclist subsequently collided into the passenger side of the vehicle. He was transported to Kaiser Richmond for what appeared to be minor injuries.

Attempted Robbery (strong arm): On October 31, 2019, at approximately 7:53 pm, Officers were dispatched to the area of Victoria Crescent West and South Shelter Bay for an attempted robbery that occurred 10 minutes ago. The victim stated she was walking in the area when she was approached by a group of 5 male juveniles. One of the males tackled her to the ground and demanded she give up her phone. A struggle ensued but she was able to retain her phone and the juveniles fled toward Trellis Bay on foot. They were described as all wearing dark hoodies with white masks.

Vandalism: On October 31, 2019, at approximately 8:09 pm, an Officer was dispatched to the 1100 block of Regatta Point for a broken vehicle window. The victim stated the driver side window of her white 2018 Chevy Cruz was shattered. She saw a group of five males wearing dark clothes and masks running away from near her vehicle. It is unknown if these subjects are related to the attempted robbery.

PRCS Violation and Possession of Burglary Tools: On November 1, 2019, at approximately 4:39 am, an Officer conducted a traffic enforcement stop on a black 2005 Volvo S80 in the 1700

block of Pheasant Dr. The driver, a 32 year old male of Pittsburg was determined to be on PRCS for evading a Peace Officer. During a compliance check, the Officer located multiple shaved vehicle keys on his person. He was placed under arrest and transported to the Martinez Detention Facility.

Outside Assist: On November 2, 2019, at approximately 5:08 am, Officers responded to the 2600 block of Silverado Drive of Pinole to assist Pinole PD with a shots fired call. Hercules Officers assisted in detaining two subjects and clearing the house of any further suspects.

Warrant Arrest: On November 3, 2019 at approximately 8:47 pm, an Officer stopped a White 1996 Dodge van in the area of John Muir Parkway at San Pablo Ave for a traffic violation. One of the passengers of the van was identified as a 34 year old male of Vallejo and he was determined to have two outstanding misdemeanor warrants for his arrest. He was placed under arrest for the warrants and later released due to a medical issue.

Vandalism: On November 3, 2019, at approximately 9:41 pm, an Officer was dispatched to a residence in the 100 block of Maritime Terrace for a report of a vandalism. The victim stated he parked his 2014 Toyota Corolla in front of his residence at approximately 4:00 pm. When he returned around the time of call, he found his front passenger side window broken, but none of his property missing. At this point there was no additional leads or evidence in this case.

Vandalism: On November 4, 2019, at approximately 11:41 am, an Officer was dispatched to the 200 block of Linus Pauling Drive for a vandalism to a vehicle. At approximately 7:30 am this morning, the security manager for Bio Rad discovered a vehicle belonging to Bio Rad had the driver's side front window broken. The damage occurred sometime over the weekend and there was nothing missing from the vehicle.

The 56 year old female, of Hercules, stated she was turning southbound on Refugio Valley Road, from westbound Sycamore Ave. A silver vehicle, traveling eastbound on Sycamore, Ave struck the front of her vehicle. The suspect vehicle continued eastbound without stopping.

The slim suspect grabbed the victim's Apple Macbook laptop computer and both suspects ran out of the restaurant. The victim chased the suspects. The slim suspect, with the laptop, fell and the victim struggled with the suspect to get his laptop back. The heavy set suspect hit the victim, with his fist, and the suspects were able to break free, with the laptop, and ran to a waiting vehicle described as a white Toyota sedan, and it drove away. There was a third suspect driving the Toyota. The victim did not sustain and injuries from the altercation.

CRIME PREVENTION TIP: Suspects committing this type of crime are usually after your valuables but they often carry weapons. Your best, and safest, choice is to let them have your "Stuff". Property can be replaced, you cannot.

Theft by False Pretense: On November 12, 2019 at approximately 8:43 pm, HPD officers responded to the 1100 block of Avocet Drive regarding an unwanted subject who was knocking at the RP's door. Officers located the adult male. The subject stated he leased the residence today and wired the money to a person who allegedly lives out of state. The investigating officer

determined the person offering the property for rent, was not the property owner. It appears the subject was a victim of a rental scam.
