Path to Transit Grand Opening and Bayfront Celebration

The second phase of the Hercules Regional Intermodal Transportation Center is nearing completion. Everyone is invited to the Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting for this important investment in our infrastructure on Sunday, March 5th at 11:30 AM. This \$14.5 million grant funded project includes an extension of John Muir Parkway, a new bridge across Refugio Creek to connect to Bayfront Boulevard, the restoration of Refugio Creek, and a new Creekside Trail. These improvements pave the way for the next phases required to get a train to stop in Hercules. The Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting will be followed by a Bayfront Celebration on Bayfront Boulevard with a car show, food trucks, entertainment, and informational booths, from 11:30 AM to 2:30 PM.

Housing Authority wait lists are opening up

Housing demand continues to outpace supply, especially for lower-income residents.

The Federal Government's long-term disinvestment in public housing has made the problem worse, leaving tens of thousands of Bay Area residents without support.

But there is a bit of good news now.

The Housing Authority of Contra Costa County will open its low income Public Housing wait list on Monday, February 27 until Thursday, March 2. Applications will be available online only at www.contracostahousing.org beginning at 10 a.m. on February 27. For more information, please contact 925-957-8031.

The City of Pittsburg Housing Authority will also accept on-line applications for the Housing Choice Voucher program wait list (also known as Section 8), beginning Wednesday, February 8, through Friday, February 10, each day between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. The list may close earlier, depending on the volume of applications received, so the earlier the better!

WATERFRONT BAYFRONT PROJECT INTRO AT 2/21 PLANNING COMMISSION

On Tuesday February 21st, the Planning Commission will be introduced to the developer Ledcor to review the first development plan in the City's long awaited Bayfront-Waterfront. The development of Block N located between John Muir Parkway, Bayfront Boulevard, and Refugio Creek is anticipated to include 159 market rate apartments, 16 townhome units and approximately 6,000 square feet of retail space. Come see what is on the horizon as Hercules continues to move forward.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations – Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. They responded to the series of storms by removing that had fallen, including a large Eucalyptus that blocked Refugio Valley Road. They also kept catch basins clear and patched potholes caused by the rain. Staff also repaired streetlights and replaced signs throughout town, and oversaw repairs to the Promenade sewer lift station.

Engineering –Construction on the \$11.7M Path To Transit phase of the Regional Intermodal Transit Center is nearly completed. The contractor is installing landscaping and paved the Creekside Trail later this week. The Bay Trail West segment has been designed and is slated for construction Summer 2017. Staff has secured the environmental permits for the project. The developer for the Muir Pointe residential development completed installing the utilities on John Muir Parkway. The \$46M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is moving forward on schedule, the contractor is constructing the new headworks facility and solid waste handling facility. The project will span 3 years and is 33% complete. The City's pavement management program update is nearing completion and staff is focusing on transportation-related grant funding opportunities and next year's street resurfacing projects. The pool replastering project at the Community Center has been affected by the rain but is still schedule to be completed in late February.

AQUATICS:

Pool Closure:

The re-plastering work is scheduled to be completed by the end of February, and the City plans to reopen the pool by March 1. The contractors are looking for a break in the weather to plaster the pool. Barring any changes to the upcoming weather, the project should be able to meet the plan, and stay on schedule.

Swim Teams:

During the closure, the City of Hercules made arrangements for the East Bay Silver Dolphins Swim Team to practice at the Crockett Swimming Pool, part of the Crockett Community Services District. The High School swim team has also been swimming there since the start of their season (February 6), and will continue to do so until our pool project is completed.

Year round registration for the Hercules East Bay Silver Dolphins is underway. To join the team, swimmers must be able to swim 25 yards unassisted; swim practices are based on the swimmer's swimming ability which is determined by the coaching staff. Beginners are classified as Spinners (\$80 per month), intermediate swimmers are classified as Age Group (\$86 per month), and the advanced swimmers are the Advance Group (\$96 per month). At the time of registration, the swimmer's first and last month's dues are paid in full, as well as a USA swimmer fee of \$80 made payable to EBSD.

Lap Swim Hours:

Lap swim is not available at this time due to pool closure.

CHILD CARE:**Tiny Tots Programs (Preschool):**

Two of our Preschool classes are in the process of signing up for Kindergarten School year 2017-2018. Our other two classes will hold pre-registration from February 27, to March 17. Pre-registration is for current families and sibling in the program only. Children going into kindergarten can also sign up for our summer camp program, since this program begins at age 5 and goes up through fifth grade.

Some of our current families tell us there signing up for the school district T-K program school year 2017-2018 and will not be signing up for our Jr. Kinder or Pre-Kinder classes. We will see if this impacts us when we have public registration on March 22, 2017. We have had several conversations with parents who praise our Preschool program, but the school district T-K program is free from 9am-2pm daily.

2016-2017 K-5th Grade Before & After School program:

Presidents Camp 2017 will be held at Lupine Child Care the week of February 21-24. All three sites are pushing the Presidents camp to ensure that it runs. We need a minimum number of 14 to run the program. At this time we still do not have anyone enrolled in our President's Camp at the Lupine site.

We are currently working on summer and fall registration packets. Pre-registration enrollment for current families begins February 27. Public registration begins March 22, 2017 for Child Care/Preschool programs.

Identity Theft/ BobCop: On January 24, 2017, a citizen from the 1200 block of Devonwood submitted an online report for identity theft. The reporting party said on January 11, 2017 she received a letter stating a PayPal account had been issued in her name. She stated she did not have PayPal account. She contacted the company and learned a second account was opened in February 2016. The billing address was Omaha, NE.

Coroner's Case: On February 2, 2017, at about 5:30 pm, Officers were dispatched to the 100 block of Overlook Terrace for a report of an unresponsive male. Officers located a 55 year old male in the master bedroom. He was unconscious and not breathing. CPR was initiated. The male was pronounced deceased, by Paramedics at 6:06 pm. No evidence of foul play was located. The Coroner's Office responded and took possession of the body.

Residential Burglary: On February 2, 2017, at about 7:15pm, an Officer was dispatched to the 3100 block of South Front Street for a residential burglary. The reporting party said, sometime between 12:00pm and the time of call, someone broke into his house and took electronics. A possible point of entry might have been a side window but no signs of force were located.

Warrant Arrest: On February 3rd, 2017, at about 3:17am, an Officer conducted a pedestrian stop in the area of San Pablo Avenue and Victoria Crescent West. 30 year old Shaine Ramon Jackson was found to have a non-citable warrant held by the CCCSO. Jackson was taken into custody and

was transported to the Martinez Detention Facility.

Residential Burglary: On February 3, 2017, at about 5:40pm, Officers were dispatched to the 100 block of Dartford for a report of a residential burglary. The reporting party said he returned home, after being gone for 20 minutes, and found his home had been burglarized. The suspect(s) gained entry by breaking a kitchen window.

Possession of Controlled Substance/Drug Paraphernalia/Probation Violation: On February 4th, 2017, at about 8:17pm, an Officer conducted a traffic stop, on a green 1997 Ford Explorer, in the area of San Pablo Avenue and Victoria Crescent West. The driver, 39 year old Tyiesha Roshawn Farr of San Pablo, was determined to be on searchable probation. During a probation search a substance, believed to be a narcotic, and a glass pipe were located. Farr was placed under arrest. She was later cited and released.

Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol: On February 5th, 2017, at about 3:51am, Officers were dispatched to an unknown problem in the 800 block of Willow Avenue. A female had asked an employee at Circle K to call the police and was seen attempting to enter a white vehicle. Upon arrival, Officers located the female in a white Honda Accord. The Honda Accord attempted to leave the scene but was stopped by an Officer. The driver of the vehicle, 23 year old Joshua Richard Amey of Oakland, displayed the objective symptoms of being under the influence of an alcoholic beverage. Amey was given the Standard Field Sobriety Test; and the Preliminary Alcohol Screening Device indicated he was above the presumptive limit for the purposes of driving. Amey was placed under arrest. He was later was cite/released to a responsible party.

Stolen Vehicle/Recovered Stolen Vehicle: On February 5, 2017, at about 10:40am, an Officer was dispatched to the 200 block of Oxford Street to take a stolen vehicle report. The reporting party said an unknown suspect stole his Black '11 GMC Yukon sometime this morning. The Yukon was last seen parked in front of his house at about 5:45am this morning. A neighbor knocked on his front door at about 9:30am this morning and handed him the DMV registration card. The neighbor said he found it lying in the street. The Yukon was entered into SVS as a stolen vehicle. At 11:30am, the Officer did an area check and found the Yukon parked in in the 200 block of Brighton Street.

Vandalism: On February 5, 2017, at about 12:06pm, Officers were dispatched to the 300 block of Turquoise Drive for a report of a possible residential burglary in progress. The resident stated she could hear a cracking noise at her side door. The resident said she was home alone with her 8 year old Grandson. The resident heard noises coming from her side garage door and saw subjects at her kitchen window. The resident locked her and her Grandson inside of a downstairs bathroom. Officers arrived and saw a Black '09 Infiniti FX35 parked, on the left side of the driveway, with the ignition running. Officers contacted an adult female, and juvenile male, coming out of the backyard. The female said she recently broke up with her boyfriend and was trying to get back into her previous residence to get her belongings. The resident said the female did not have permission to be at the house. The resident wanted to press charges against the damaging her Property. The female and juvenile male were released pending further investigation

Lost Property: On February 5, 2017 at about 2:14pm, an Officer was dispatched to Home Depot, 1625 Sycamore Avenue to take a theft report. The reporting party stated she lost her iPhone with attached card wallet approximately 30 minutes ago. The reporting party was told, by Home Depot

store employees, that a man showed up at the customer service counter telling them he found a phone. The man told the Home Depot employees he was going to attempt to return the phone with wallet to the owner's home. The reporting party hasn't heard from the man who found her phone with wallet as of yet.

Driving under the influence of alcohol: On February 5, 2017, at about 10:19pm, while on a call on Village Parkway at Hercules Avenue, an Officer first heard and then saw a Nissan Altima driving E/B on Hercules Avenue. The Altima turned right onto S/B Village Parkway driving past the Officer. The vehicle had moderate right front damage and was traveling on the right front rim. The female driver was alone and failed to stop for the officer. The Officer began searching for the vehicle and located it on Village Parkway south of Glenwood. While inspecting the vehicle an adult male walked up. He said his ex-wife told him she had a flat so he came down to see if he could fix it. The officer went to the 100 block of Scotts Valley and met with 44 year old Bertha Lopez. Lopez showed objective signs of alcohol intoxication. She was administered the Standard Field Sobriety Test; and the Preliminary Alcohol Screening device indicated Lopez was above the presumptive limit for the purposes of driving. She was arrested. Lopez is also on probation and was driving on a suspended license. She was transported to the Martinez Detention Facility.

Vehicle Collision (Complaint of Pain): On February 6, 2017, at about 7:19am, Hercules Officers were dispatched to the area of Willow Avenue near the Transit Lot for a reported overturned vehicle. Officers arrived and located a White '01 Honda Civic, on its roof on N/B Willow Avenue just north of the E/B I-80 off-ramp. Officers contacted the driver of the Civic who had already extracted herself. The driver complained of pain to her head but otherwise had no visible injuries. The driver said she was exiting E/B I-80 into Hercules when she lost control of her Civic and hit the dirt berm causing her vehicle to overturn. The driver was transported to Kaiser Vallejo due to her complaint of pain.

Grand Theft: On February 6, 2017, at about 3:1 pm, an Officer was dispatched to 500 Mahogany Lane to take a theft report. The reporting party said an unknown suspect entered his unlocked vehicle sometime between 3:00pm yesterday and 3:00am this morning. The unknown suspect stole several electronic items. The Officer located one of the stolen items, a portable DVD player, in the street nearby.

Misc. Info: On February 6, 2017, at about 9:19pm, an Officer was flagged down by motorist who stated he was the victim of a hit and run. He stated his truck was hit by an adult female, driving a Honda CRV, on Turquoise near Sycamore Avenue. The two drivers drove into the Lucky's parking lot to exchange info. After looking at the cars she drove off without exchanging info. The Officer inspected the reporting party's vehicle and it was undamaged. The reporting party stated he did not see any damage on the Honda. The collision did not damage a vehicle or injure a person and therefore is not a collision.

Recovered Stolen Vehicle: On February 6, 2017, at about 10:34pm, a stolen 97 Ford box van was located parked on the shoulder of Willow Avenue at Sycamore Avenue. The truck's driver window was shattered and was reported stolen to Livermore PD on January 27, 2017. The vehicle was cold plated with a 2015 Ford truck license plate.

of the BMW began spinning donuts and completed 6 rotations before continuing s/b on San Pablo Avenue. The Officer stopped 18 year old Luis Aguilar and determined the BMW he was driving had a false registration tab attached to the rear plate. The Officer cited Aguilar for Reckless Driving. The vehicle was towed because it was an unregistered vehicle.

Possession of Illegal Contraband for Sales/Warrant Arrest: On February 7, 2017, at about 7:05am, Officers were dispatched to the parking lot in the 800 block of Willow Avenue for a report of a WMA and WFA possibly using a controlled substance inside a Blue Ford Ranger with a camper shell. Officers arrived and located the vehicle parked in the middle of the parking near Starbucks. The Ranger was occupied by a WMA driver and a WFA passenger. A BFA was standing outside on the driver's side speaking to the WMA driver. Officers identified the BFA as 32 year old Quinisha Abram of Rodeo. The driver of the Ranger was identified as 58 year old Gregory Huff of Rodeo. Abram was found to have an outstanding Misdemeanor No Cite Warrant and was placed under arrest. During this investigation, Officers saw a small Marijuana pipe underneath Huff's left leg when he was initially contacted. A probable cause search of Huff and the Ranger was conducted. Officers located controlled substances and evidence of possession of contraband for sale. Huff was arrested and Abram and Huff were later transported to the Martinez Detention Facility. Due to Huff requiring immediate medical attention, he was later released per 849 PC. The Ranger was towed by Civic Center Tow.

Petty Theft: On February 7, 2017, at about 9:17am, Cpl. Barazoto was dispatched to a residence in the 100 block of Paradise Drive for a reported theft. The victim said he accidentally failed to properly lock/secure two of his Mountain bikes (valued at \$800) to the railing near his apartment.
