The statue of Hercules by artist Paul Manship has been received for inspection here in Hercules and is in my office for the moment as shown in the picture. Just this week we reactivated our efforts to raise funds to Bring Hercules Home after the owner of the piece lowered his price to reflect something closer to where our fundraising effort stalled last year. We were looking to raise just over \$3,000 with \$2,450 of that already pledged at the start of the week. I am happy to report that thanks to some very generous residents, we achieved our fundraising goal! As such, Hercules is here to stay and will be on display in City Hall until he can be permanently located to the future Regional Intermodal Transportation Center. Thank you so much to our very generous donors.

Market Hall/Safeway Development

The Planning Commission will be undertaking their first formal review session on the proposed new Safeway on the Market Hall site at Sycamore and San Pablo on Monday evening next week, July 17th at 7 PM. If all goes well, the developer indicates the new store would be under construction late this year with a planned opening in December 2018.


How a community looks, feels, and functions is greatly impacted by how a City's overall "transportation network" is built, expanded, or altered as new development is constructed or capital projects are carried out. The City's blue print guide of how, what, and where transportation related improvements should be carried out is laid out in its Circulation Element which includes roadways serving trucks/vehicles/bicyclists, bikeways, sidewalks, trails, transit, rail, ferry, and evacuation routes (referred to as the "transportation network"). The policy in this General Plan Element provides direction that can then form the basis for grant funding, capital improvement budgets, or requirements for new development to construct and improve the transportation network into 2040.

- * *Attend and learn about existing systems and potential shortfalls /gaps as the community continues to develop*
 - * *Share your thoughts on what types of potential solutions should be considered in the draft policies if not already included*

2017 Street Resurfacing Project Approved

The City Council approved a contract this week to undertake a slurry seal, crack seal, and street repair project on a number of streets in the community. The work will start later in June on a variety of street segments including James Watson Drive, Alfred Nobel Drive, Lupine Road, Dogwood Court, Cottonwood Court, Manzanita Place, Wolet Road, Redwood Road, Turquoise Drive, Mandalay Avenue and Grenadine Way, as shown on the map below. The City and the contractor, OC Jones, will shortly be determining the final staging of the work and will be reaching out to impacted residents to advise them of the schedule on any parking or access restrictions.

- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "A," including providing an annual report, to ensure that utility user tax funds are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2013.
- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "O," including providing an annual report, to ensure that the sales tax revenues approved by Hercules voters are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2012.

Safeway Project’s Initial Public Hearing on Monday, July 17th 7pm Planning Commission

At the July 17, 2017, Planning Commission public hearing, the developer and staff will present the proposed Safeway Shopping Center project design and traffic impact analysis as it relates to consistency with the General Plan, City of Hercules Zoning Ordinance, and other required regulations of the City. This initial project hearing will give both the Commission and the public an opportunity to ask questions and make comments about the project and City requirements, and will give the applicant an opportunity to present project changes which have occurred since the Planning Commission Study Session held on December 16, 2016 and the Community Meeting held January 21, 2017 on Conceptual plans and receive initial feedback. Additionally, the Draft Traffic Impact Analysis is now available to start the environmental review and discussion on the traffic topic.

The full environmental analysis will not be available until late August and therefore the full project review of all of the environmental analyses, further specific technical analysis of the project, and draft resolutions and environmental documentation to allow the Planning Commission to make recommendations regarding the project entitlements to the City Council is anticipated to be discussed and decided on at a Special Meeting of the Planning Commission on Tuesday, September 5, 2017 due to the Labor Day holiday.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations – Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. They also had large branches and trees that had fallen removed from Refugio and Ohlone Parks, oversaw the completion of fire breaks, put the annual striping contract out to bid, and repaired streetlights throughout town. Staff also participated in the Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Disposal event held on Saturday, July 8. A total of 450 cars brought HHW for disposal.

Engineering –The summer slurry seal project was awarded to OC Jones and is anticipated to start next month and will improve streets in the Gems, Trees, Flowers, and Mandalay. The Bay Trail West project is in final design and will be bid out shortly. Staff is also preparing to bid out the sanitary sewer collection system cleaning & inspection. The \$46M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is moving forward on schedule, the contractor is constructing the new headworks facility and solid waste handling facility. The project will span 3 years with completion scheduled for November 2018. The speed survey which confirms the speed limits on streets is nearing completion.
