The Great Solar Eclipse

Are you ready to *Do Your Thing* and reduce electricity use during The Great Solar Eclipse on August 21, 2017? The California Public Utilities Commission is encouraging a reduction in electricity usage from 9 a.m. until 11 a.m. during The Great Solar Eclipse on August 21, 2017. This will allow California to burn fewer fossil fuels and emit fewer greenhouse gas emissions when California's solar energy production dips during the eclipse. A new website, www.CalEclipse.org, offers tips to help reduce usage during the eclipse and year-round!

On Monday, August 21, 2017, a total solar eclipse will pass over the Pacific Northwest affecting the California solar resources supplying power to the grid. The eclipse is expected to occur from 9:02 a.m. to 11:54 a.m., with the moon obscuring 58 to 76 percent of solar rays, depending on the resource location, and causing a loss of 4,194 megawatts (MW) of California large scale solar electricity. The City of Hercules will be doing what it can to reduce electricity consumption, and here are a few tips about what you can do at home:

- Be a vampire slayer: The morning of the eclipse, unplug the things that are "always on" but don't need to be. Twenty-three percent of the electricity used to power home electronics is consumed while the products are turned off (what we call "vampires"). The average U.S. household spends \$100 per year to power devices while they are off or in standby mode. The morning of the eclipse, unplug things like coffee makers, televisions, computers, and gadgets that are always on (but not the refrigerator!).
- Before the eclipse, change at least half of your lightbulbs to LEDs: If all Californians upgraded to LED light bulbs, the state could reduce CO2 emissions equivalent to those produced by one coal-fired power plant in one year. Upgrading to LED light bulbs will use at least 75 percent less energy and last 25 times longer than "old fashioned" incandescent. And, of course, make sure

all unnecessary lights are off during the eclipse!

- Turn up (or off) your air conditioner: You can save a lot of energy by just nudging your air conditioning thermostat up by three degrees if you are home. If you are not home, you'll save a lot more by just turning it off. If you are not home and your beloved pets Fido or Fifi are, they perfectly comfortable at 80 degrees according to many veterinarians. Closing curtains or shades will go a long way to keeping your home cool on a warm day.

- Work with the Parks and Recreation Department on the development and evaluation of recreation programs and community activities/events.
- Provide assistance and support in the planning and operation of City sponsored community events.
- In cooperation and consultation with the Parks and Recreation Department, make recommendations to the City Council with respect to priorities for recreation, library, and community services expenditures in the City's capital improvement program.
- Review and comment on the annual operating and capital improvement budgets for the Parks and Recreation Department.
- Make recommendations with respect to community service needs such as child care, youth summer employment, senior activities/programs, and recreational programs.
- Review and make recommendations with respect to fees for the use of parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and community buildings.
- Advise on matters of policy and public interest related to the management, use and preservation of library facilities and property.
- Render such other specific services as are consistent with the role of an advisory board on the library system, to include recommendations and advice to the county librarian on matters related to the Hercules library.

- The Commission member serving as the City’s Area Representative to the Contra Costa County Library Commission shall routinely report to the entire Community and Library Services Commission on actions taken at the Contra Costa Library Commission meetings.
- Review and make recommendations regarding the Arts in Public Places Program and exhibits at the Hercules Public Library.
- Oversee the Heritage Memorial Garden Plaque Program which is designed to recognize Hercules residents or civic leaders and enhance the historical aspect of the garden.
- Oversee the Library Art Exhibition Program which is designed to review art pieces submitted by participants of the program to be allowed to display their art pieces at the Hercules Public Library.
- Such other duties relating to recreation activities and community and library service needs as may be directed by the City Council.

- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure “O,” including providing an annual report, to ensure that the sales tax revenues approved by Hercules voters are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2012.

Planning Division

- Planning Department approved Administrative Design Review Permit No. 17-35 at 2325 Redwood Rd for Antonio Pineda to allow a 10'6" tall x14'5" x 30' 9-1/2" covered patio in the back of the existing house, a 4' tall Versa-Lok concrete retaining wall, and a 6' wooden fence

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations – Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. Additionally, striping, tree trimming, and streetlight relamping (for the Hercules Transit Center) contracts are out for bid. The goats completed abating weeds in the hills and have left town. The Lupine Child Care facility was painted, a new gate was installed at the Community Swim Center, a hazardous tree was removed from Refugio Park, and the new facilities maintenance vehicle - a Ford Transit Connect van, was received and is being outfitted for service.

Engineering –The summer slurry seal project was awarded and will be starting in August. Staff is preparing to bid out the sanitary sewer collection system cleaning & inspection as well as a solicitation for a part time contract sanitary sewer project manager.

The \$46M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is moving forward on schedule, the contractor is constructing the new headworks facility and solid waste handling facility. The project will span 3 years, is over 50% complete at this time, and on schedule for completion in November 2018. The speed survey which confirms the speed limits on streets is nearing completion. Taylor Morrison, the developer for Muir Pointe, is completing public improvements on John Muir Parkway to allow for the first phase of occupancy. Last, the Bay Trail West Project is out to bid.



Identity Theft: On July 27, 2017 at 1:51pm, a Hercules resident came to HPD to report being a victim of fraud. On July 13, 2017 an unknown suspect opened a fraudulent account, on-line, using his identifying information and made a large purchase.

Resisting/Delaying Officer: On July 27, 2017 at 11:10pm, an Officer conducted a pedestrian stop of a male adult, for jay walking, on Willow Ave. near Hawthorne. The subject initially provided a false name to the Officer, who was able to truly identify the subject after locating his wallet in his pocket. The subject was a 20 year old, from San Francisco. The subject was found to have four outstanding warrants out of San Francisco County. The subject was arrested and handcuffed. Before he could be placed into the patrol vehicle, he broke free, from the officer, and sprinted toward the rear of the 700 block of Willow Ave. A search of the area, involving CHP air support, revealed negative results for the suspect.

Lost/Stolen Plate: On July 28, 2017 at 8:00am, an Officer was dispatched to HPD for a lobby detail. The Hercules resident stated her rear license plate was stolen from her vehicle, which was parked near her home, sometime after 8:45pm last night.

Out of control party: On July 28th, 2017 at 9:50pm, Officers responded to the 400 block of Violet Rd, for the second time, due to a loud party. Both sides of the street were lined with vehicles and some of the nearby neighbors' driveways were blocked. There was a live DJ in the backyard and music could be heard from several houses away. The party organizer stated the house was rented, via Airbnb, for a rap party. Large numbers of people continued arriving, at the party, after the officers arrived. Due to the extreme noise levels, numerous complaint calls, and general overcrowding of people in one residence, the party was shut down. Approximately 200 + people poured out of the residence and loitered in the area for approximately 45 minutes. Several neighbors voiced their frustrations with the ongoing parties at the home.

Traffic Collision/Private Property: On July 29, 2017 at 3:57pm, HPD officers were dispatched to Valley Run and Range Ct for a report of a collision involving a Dirt Bike and a parked vehicle. The 19 male driver lost control of the Dirt Bike as he rounded the curve on Valley Run. The male drove the Dirt Bike into the side of a black Honda Civic that was parked in Range Ct. The male injured his left leg but declined to be transported to the hospital.

Negligent discharge of paint ball gun: On July 29, 2017 at 7:33pm, a citizen, about to visit a business in the 1900 block of Railroad Ave, called police. The reporting party said they were struck in the back by a yellow paint ball, fired from a passing early 2000s' dark gray Toyota Camry with dark tinted rear windows. The reporting party was not hurt and an area check for the vehicle was conducted with negative results.

Disturbance call notice of violation: On July 29, 2017 at 10:47pm, a neighbor complained of the noise in the 400 block of Violet. The address was the same house the officers shut down a very large party on July 28th. The officer earlier noticed another party going on at the location prior to the complaint.
