Willow/Palm Sidewalk Improvement Project Funds

The Contra Costa Transportation Agency Board took action recently to approve a number of projects to be funded with Measure J funds, including a project proposed by the City of Hercules - the Willow/Palm sidewalk and pedestrian improvement project. This project was awarded \$1.058 million in Measure J funds. The project will consist of extending a sidewalk along Palm Avenue from Sycamore and under the railroad underpass, continuing along Willow to the Hercules

Transit Center. This action means we can now proceed with final design and can move the project towards construction.

Safeway Project Approved

On Tuesday, September 26, 2018, the City Council took the final actions to approve the proposed Safeway and fueling center, plus additional retail, on the site bounded by Sycamore, San Pablo, Hwy 4 and Interstate 80. This new center is expected to generate significant new sales tax revenues and will provide more shopping options for our residents. Construction may start before the end of the year and the new Safeway hopes to be open before the end of 2018.

Slurry Seal Project

The slurry seal project on a variety of streets in the City has been completed though new striping and other elements are still to be done. There will be intermittent disruptions along these streets as this work is completed. A slurry seal greatly extends the life of a street and the City is glad we are able to invest in our infrastructure. We would like to thank our residents for their cooperation and patience with the detours and lack of access which were necessary to get this work done.

Walking & Hiking

Hercules is a great town for walking and hiking. The City's network of trails, both formal and informal, give residents plenty of options. The trail network will be enhanced soon with the start of the Bay Trail West which will run from Railroad Avenue towards Santa Fe. A construction contract for this grant funded project has been awarded and construction will be starting in the next 30 to 45 days as a phase of the City's Regional Intermodal Transportation Center. Most days I enjoy a lunchtime walk up Refugio Valley Road from City Hall to the Recreation Center and back. I am often joined by other City staff members and occasionally take other routes and use the walks for a site visit or inspection. On the weekends, members of my family and I can often be found on the Bay Trail or walking around the neighborhoods near where we live. One the best attributes of Hercules is our network of trails and the amount of open space we are able to enjoy.

Parking Enforcement

With some part-time staffing and volunteers, the City has been able to restore a level of parking enforcement. I would encourage our residents to be mindful of local and state laws regarding parking which are now being enforced more regularly. A key local law requires that any vehicle parked on a public street cannot be parked for more than 72 hours without being moved. So if you are not using your care, or going away on vacation, be sure it is moved at least every 72 hours or parked off-street. Also, vehicles with expired registration can be stored on private property, but may not parked on a public street; if they are, they may be towed.

Trash Cans

As a reminder, it is a requirement that garbage cans cannot be located or stored in front or side yards and visible from the street. On pick-up days, garbage cans can be placed to allow for pick-up, and they should be removed from view after garbage pick-up. Please be a good neighbor and be sure to remove your garbage cans as soon as possible.

Planning Commission – Two (2) Vacancies with terms ending December 2019

The Planning Commission meets the first and third Mondays of every month at 7 p.m. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has statutory duties imposed by State law. The Commission:

- Performs all functions assigned to it by the zoning and design review ordinances of the City.
- Reviews and makes recommendations to the Council on the general plan, specific neighborhood plans, tentative subdivision maps, environmental impact reports, and planned unit developments.
- Reviews the capital improvements program and makes recommendations to the Council.
- Provides design review of proposed buildings and other construction projects and reviews landscape plans.
- Grants use permits and variances.

Finance Commission – Two (2) Vacancies with terms ending December 2019, One (1) Vacancy for an unexpired term ending December 31, 2018

The Finance Commission meets the fourth Monday of every month at 7 p.m. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has the following duties:

- Quarterly review of City's financial status; review and comment on audit reports, the proposed operating budget and the capital improvement program budgets.
- Makes recommendations to the Council with respect to budget priorities.
- Advises the Council on matters of policy and public interest related to the management of the City's finances and budget.
- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "A," including providing an annual report, to ensure that utility user tax funds are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2013.
- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "O," including providing an annual report, to ensure that the sales tax revenues approved by Hercules voters are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2012.

Community & Library Services Commission – One (1) vacancy with a term ending December 31, 2019, One (1) Student Commissioner seat with a term ending December 31, 2018, one (1) Vacancy with an unexpired term ending December 31, 2018.

The Community and Library Services Commission meets on the second Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Hercules City Council Chambers located at 111 Civic Drive, Hercules, CA 94547. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has the following duties:

- Develop plans and recommendations for parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and use of community buildings.
- Work with the Parks and Recreation Department on the development and evaluation of recreation programs and community activities/events.
- Provide assistance and support in the planning and operation of City sponsored community events.
- In cooperation and consultation with the Parks and Recreation Department, make recommendations to the City Council with respect to priorities for recreation, library, and community services expenditures in the City's capital improvement program.
- Review and comment on the annual operating and capital improvement budgets for the Parks and Recreation Department.
- Make recommendations with respect to community service needs such as child care, youth summer employment, senior activities/programs, and recreational programs.
- Review and make recommendations with respect to fees for the use of parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and community buildings.
- Advise on matters of policy and public interest related to the management, use and preservation of library facilities and property.
- Render such other specific services as are consistent with the role of an advisory board on the library system, to include recommendations and advice to the county librarian on matters related to the Hercules library.
- The Commission member serving as the City's Area Representative to the Contra Costa County Library Commission shall routinely report to the entire Community and Library Services Commission on actions taken at the Contra Costa Library Commission meetings.
- Review and make recommendations regarding the Arts in Public Places Program and exhibits at the Hercules Public Library.
- Oversee the Heritage Memorial Garden Plaque Program which is designed to recognize Hercules residents or civic leaders and enhance the historical aspect of the garden.
- Oversee the Library Art Exhibition Program which is designed to review art pieces submitted by participants of the program to be allowed to display their art pieces at the Hercules Public Library.
- Such other duties relating to recreation activities and community and library service needs as may be directed by the City Council.

Upcoming Planning Commission Workshops on Monday, October 16, 2017

Sycamore Crossing (on the northwest corner of San Pablo and Sycamore Avenues):

The new developer of the site will be sharing what they have done to market the site over the last year and share conceptual designs with the Planning Commission for a potential drug store, restaurant uses, hotel and single family detached residential. The draft fiscal analysis shows a positive cash flow to the City over \$500,000 annually once the project is occupied. Hillcrest (at the Hilltown site on the northwestern corner of State Route 4 and San Pablo Avenue):

Revised plans have been submitted to include either hotel and multi-family apartments or retail and multi-family apartments on the lower half of the site (on approximately 6 acres) and approximately 135 single family detached homes on the top of the site (on approximately 13 acres of land), leaving approximately 21 acres of land as open space.

City Council Approved Safeway Center Project on September 12, 2017

The Safeway Center final project entitlements and environmental assessment were approved by the City Council at their last meeting which paves the way for the project!!! It is anticipated that the developer will submit construction drawings before the end of the year and start construction in spring of 2018 and targeting the store opening by December 2018. The project at the north eastern corner of Sycamore and San Pablo Avenues includes

- 57,100-square-foot Safeway with an attached interior Starbucks coffee shop and an exterior seating area
- 6,000-square-foot commercial building pad with two (2) drive-thrus (anticipated for Chase Bank and Peets Coffee)
- 2,500-square-foot convenience store/minimart attached to a 20-pump fueling center

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. Additionally, contracts are being signed for streets striping and markings throughout town and re-lamping the Hercules Transit Center, both projects should be underway within the next couple of weeks. Pothole patching is in the process of being bid out. This contract will repair potholes throughout town before the rainy season. Street lights throughout town were repaired and the medians in the business park are being evaluated with respect to tree trimming and replacements as well as ground cover. New street name signs are being ordered and will be installed over the next 6 months. The backup generator at the Community Center which was recently destroyed by fire was removed and the process has begun to acquire a temporary replacement while a permanent replacement is being purchased.

Engineering

The summer slurry seal project is substantially complete. The Bay Trail West project is anticipated to begin construction later this month. The \$46M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is moving forward on schedule, the contractor is constructing the new headworks facility and solid waste handling facility. The project will span 3 years, is over 50% complete at this time, and on schedule for completion in November 2018. A contract for staff augmentation was secured with West Yost to advance the wastewater program, there is approximately \$20M in programs and projects to advance on the books. The grading plans for Sycamore Crossing were submitted and are under review.

Swim Lesson

High School Water Polo

The Hercules High School Water Polo season is in full swing. The Titans latest game was against the Clayton Valley Charter High School Ugly Eagles on September 26. Even though they didn't win the game, they are improving. The Hercules High School Principal, Paul Mansingh, was very complimentary to the Recreation Department for helping them get back into the facility here. According to Mr. Mansingh the team has tripled in size because of the use of the Community Center. We are benefiting as well, as we have lots of new lifeguards that either play on the Polo Team, or swim on the High School Swim team, or both. The Titans Water Polo team practices daily at the Hercules Swim Center and play their home games at Contra Costa Community College. If you have never seen a water polo game you are encouraged to come support the Hercules High Boys & Girls Teams and witness this exciting sport for yourself.
