Pilot Streetlight Replacement Project Moving Forward

This week the City Council approved the purchase of 77 new streetlights to initiate a Pilot Streetlight Replacement Project. Streetlights will be replaced in those Landscape & Lighting Assessment District Zones which have the resources to fully or partially fund the much needed replacement of the existing hollow-core wood poles with new aluminum poles and LED fixtures. These new poles and fixtures will be more durable and will also result in less energy use and lower annual operating costs. The Foxboro (Zone 6) area will have all of the City –owned streetlights replaced. The Refugio Heights neighborhood (Zone 7) will have 24 lights replaced on just Coronado and Carson Streets as part of the pilot. A small number of lights will be replaced in the City Parks Zone (Zone 10), and two commercial zones (Zones 5 B and 5C). The City Council also opted to replace one light as an example in each of the three following areas to illustrate what replacement street lights would look like when and if these areas opt to approve sometime in the future the funding needed to replace streetlights: Hercules by the Bay (Zone 1); Gems & Birds (Zones 3 &4); and, the Village (Zone 6). The City will be going out to bid shortly on the installation of the replacement streetlights, and we hope to have the replacement lights in place before the end of the second quarter of this year.

Bay Trail West Substantially Complete

The newest Hercules segment of the Bay Trail is substantially complete. This segment connects from Bayfront Boulevard at Railroad Avenue to the existing paved section that heads in the direction of Pinole, which together with the temporary connection along Bayfront Boulevard means the Bay Trail is continuous through Hercules. This grant funded project has some finishing touches to be completed as weather permits including the installation of some fencing, hydro-seeding and the addition of bollards to restrict vehicular access. Many residents are already enjoying this new trail segment and we hope others will get out and explore our expanding network of trails here in Hercules.

6 Ways the District's Free Service will Help You Prevent Rats and Mice

When it gets cold, most of us want to be warm. The same can be said for the [rats and mice that are found in Contra Costa County](#) because they are commensal—they live close to humans and can depend upon us for food, water, and shelter.

It's no surprise, then, that the change in seasons prompts rats and mice to migrate to areas closer to or literally inside your warm home.

“All they need is an opening as small as the size of a quarter. That's it. Then they can gain access to a house, garage, shed or any other building that can provide shelter,” said Program Supervisor Jonathan Rehana.

Once inside, they hide out, usually in dark, secluded areas where they can go unnoticed during the day and as they search for food and water at night. By the time you see the telltale signs of droppings or chewed on items, the rats and mice have not only moved in, they may have established a family.

If you suspect your home has rat or mouse activity, [contact the District to request free rat and mouse service](#). The District's service includes valuable, detailed information, guidance and recommendations.

District employees provide an inspection to determine:

1. The type of rat or mouse infestation (rats need not be present).
2. How they are gaining access to a home or other structure.
3. What is attracting the rats and mice to the location?

Once the inspection is complete, the District employee provides feedback that includes:

1. A summary of what evidence was found.
2. Recommendations on what to do to get rid of the current rats and mice.
3. Instructions on what to do to prevent future rats and mice from gaining access.

District employees do not bait or set traps, and they do not remove any animals from the premises.

Rats and mice can transmit bacterial and viral diseases through waste by walking through their own urine and fecal matter and contaminating household surfaces. Ensuring a rat and mouse-free environment reduces the risk of contracting diseases from these rodents.

January 16, 2018 Planning Commission will hold a public hearing to consider allowing beer and wine sales at the Jumping Spoon Restaurant being constructed within the Aventine mixed use building at 1375 Sycamore Avenue in Suite B. The staff report and project drawings will be available on the Planning Commission agenda of 1/16/2018.

Continued Public Hearing on Draft Circulation Element on Tuesday, 1/16/2018

The Planning Commission had a few changes they wanted to incorporate into the draft Circulation Element after their first public hearing and discussion at their December 18, 2017 meeting (all reports and documents can be accessed at <https://hercules.legistar.com/View.ashx?M=AO&ID=55813&GUID=2783718c-46e2-4713-b904-4ce374a83d03&N=QUdFTkrBIFBBQ0tFVA%3d%3d>). In order to give the public additional time to weigh in on the draft plan the public hearing was continued to the January 16th meeting. The revised **January 2018 Circulation Element Update** document will be available for public review three days prior to the meeting on the City’s website at the following link <http://www.ci.hercules.ca.us/index.aspx?page=783> which incorporates the changes requested by the Commission.

Discussion on new Accessory Dwelling Unit Policy on Tuesday, 1/16/2018

The Planning Commission will discuss potential policy changes regarding Accessory Dwelling Units (sometimes known as granny flats) to be in compliance with State law.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations – Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks and buildings. Additionally, contracts have been executed for streets striping and markings, pothole repair, and tree trimming throughout town. Work on these projects is anticipated to begin in 2 weeks, weather permitting. The new modular maintenance and operations building is being fitted with plumbing and electrical connections. New street name signs have been ordered and will be installed over the next 6 months. Staff repaired numerous streetlights throughout town, including a few which were knocked down by automobiles.

Engineering – Bay Trail West has been paved. This 0.3 mile long project eliminates the last paving gap along the waterfront and is funded with a \$1.5M grant. The \$52M Pinole-Hercules Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project is now 2/3 completed with an anticipated final completion date of February 2019. While overall the project is proceeding smoothly, most recently the new power supply provided by PG&E was delayed. The cost impacts of this delay is being assessed. The grading plans for Sycamore Crossing and public improvements for Bayfront Block N are under review. Staff is in discussions with firms to provide plan review on the Safeway Project and obtain environmental permits to dredge Lake Refugio. Staff is also beginning the design for capital projects to be constructed next construction season, including resurfacing the Refugio Valley Pedestrian Trail.


Senior Activities

Robert Pesmark was recognized with numerous awards throughout his career including a Meritorious Conduct Award, Police Officer of the Year, and Stolen Vehicle Recovery Awards. Robert Pesmark will be missed by the members of the Department and Community as he begins the next chapter of his life.

Online Report (Bob Cop) Identity Theft: On January 8, 2018, an Officer handled an online report for identity theft. January 2, 2018, the reporting party discovered an unknown person attempted to order an I Phone 8 using her personal information

Armed Robbery/Assault with a Deadly Weapon: On January 8, 2018 at approximately 12:35PM Hercules Officers were dispatched to an armed robbery, which just occurred. The location of the incident was inside the Starbucks, 842 Willow Ave. The suspects were described as two African Americana adults; wearing dark clothing; and armed with a small handgun.
